Anti-Bullying Policy

1. STATEMENT OF INTENT

At TEC Academy we are passionate about our mission to provide an education of the highest quality which develops all students to achieve their full potential.

Our anti-bullying policy supports this by:

- Promoting respect and tolerance towards everyone
- Helping students recognise what is right and wrong
- Supporting the formation of good relationships

2.3. AIM

The aim of the Anti-Bullying Policy is to ensure that students learn in a supportive, caring and safe environment without fear of being bullied; that all members of the Academy are free from fear of bullying.

Bullying is anti-social behaviour and affects everyone; it is unacceptable and will not be tolerated.

Only when all issues of bullying are addressed will students be able to fully benefit from the opportunities available in the Academy.

3.WHAT IS BULLYING?

"Behaviour by an individual or group; usually repeated over time, that intentionally hurts another individual or group either physically or emotionally".

- Bullying is the use of aggression with the intention of hurting another person.
- Bullying is usually deliberate and usually consists of repeated acts.
- Bullying results in pain and distress for the victim.

S.T.O.P. is a useful working definition:

Bullying consists of three basic types of abuse:

Emotional

For example:

being unfriendly, excluding from social groups
tormenting (hiding possessions or making threatening gestures) bossing about
hurting people's feelings, being nasty, being mean
picture/video clip (cyber) could be bullying

Verbal

For example:

name-calling
taunting
threatening
offensive remarks
texts, e-mails, Instant Messaging (cyber) could be bullying

Physical

For example:

pushing people around
kicking, hitting
taking, damaging possessions
any use of any form of physical violence could be bullying

TEC Academy recognises that bullying that is motivated by prejudice is a particular concern, for example: racist, sexist and homophobic bullying, and bullying related to perceptions about disability and/or special educational needs. Any of the above forms could be involved.

4. PROMOTION OF THIS POLICY

The policy and methods for reporting bullying concerns will be promoted throughout the Academy, for example:

- display of information within the Academy
- mailshots to families
- in information packs for new students and staff
- through regular awareness raising activities with existing students.
- through assemblies

5. PREVENTATIVE MEASURES

The Academy will:

- train staff to recognise all forms of bullying
- raise awareness of the nature of bullying through inclusion in, form time, assemblies, subject areas and informal discussion, as appropriate
- Emphasise its importance of reporting incidents of bullying, both observed and experienced, and including confidently as an option in making such reports.
- Hold an annual anti bullying week within the academy, in conjunction with nationally recognised anti bullying campaign
- Emphasising REAPETEDLY that BULLYING WILL NOT BE TOLERATED AT TEC ACADEMY
- participate in national and local initiatives such as Anti-bullying Week
- seek to develop links with the wider community that will support inclusive anti- bullying education
- use specific strategies, for example peer mentoring, on a regular basis and implement them if appropriate, subject to available resources

6.IDENTIFYING AND REPORTING CONCERNS ABOUT BULLYING

All concerns about bullying will be taken seriously and investigated thoroughly.

6.1 Students

All students (including 'onlookers' acting on behalf of another student) will be encouraged to report bullying by:

- talking to any member of staff
- talking to a friend to act as intermediary with any member of staff
- contacting local and national support agencies for advice/support

6.2 Staff

All **staff** in Academy will be charged with reporting bullying by:

- dealing with the immediate issue
- recording it on the perpetrator's SIMS record as a bullying issue

6.3 Heads of House, on receipt of information about a bullying incident, will:

- interview those involved and record the interviews. This will be held in line with the school's data protection policy/practice
- inform Tutors, and if it persists, advise the appropriate subject teachers
- contact parents/carers
- put in place appropriate consequences

6.4 Parents/carers

All responsible adults will be encouraged to report concerns about bullying and to support the Academy in tackling it, by:

- contacting the Academy by telephone and speaking with their child's tutor, Head of House or a senior member of staff.

7.RESPONDING TO REPORTS ABOUT BULLYING

7.1 The Academy

TEC Academy will take the following steps when dealing with concerns about bullying:

- if bullying is suspected/reported, it will be dealt with by the member of staff who has been made aware of it
- a clear account of the concern will be recorded and given to the Head of House
- the Head of House will interview those involved and record the interviews. This will be held in line with the school's data protection policy/practice
- Tutors will be kept informed and, if it persists, the appropriate subject teachers
- Parents/Carers and other relevant adults will be kept informed

- where bullying takes place outside of the Academy, any other relevant schools or agencies (e.g. youth clubs, transport providers) will be informed about the concerns and any actions taken

- consequences will be used as appropriate and in consultation with all parties involved

7.2 Students and staff

Students and staff who have been bullied will be supported by:

- offering an opportunity to discuss any issues with a member of staff of their choice
- providing reassurance that the bullying will be addressed
- offering continuous support to restore self-esteem and confidence
- the use of specialist interventions and/or referrals to other agencies where appropriate

Students who have bullied will be helped by:

- discussing what happened and why the student became involved
- establishing the wrong doing and need to change
- informing parents/carers to help change the attitude of the student
- the use of specialist interventions and/or referrals to other agencies where appropriate

7.3 Parents/Carers

Most concerns about bullying should be resolved through discussion between home and the Academy.

- parents/carers will be asked to support the Academy in the consequences taken
- where a student is involved in bullying others outside Academy, (e.g. in the street or through the use of the internet at home) parents/carers will be asked to work with the Academy in addressing their child's behaviour (e.g. restricting/monitoring their use of the internet or mobile phone)
- referral of the family to external support agencies may be made where appropriate
- where a parent/carer feels their concerns have not been resolved, they would be encouraged to use the formal Complaints Procedure

The following consequences can follow:

- official warnings to cease offending behaviour
- mediation
- detention
- exclusion from certain areas of school premises
- confiscation of mobile phones, in line with Academy policy
- minor fixed-term exclusion
- major fixed-term exclusion
- permanent exclusion

8. MONITORING, EVALUATION AND REVIEW

Mrs R Walker has been identified to lead on the implementation of the policy and act as the link person with the local authority.

An annual report will be made to the governing body, including statistics about:

- the number of reported concerns
- monitoring information about the students involved
- motivations for bullying
- actions taken and outcomes

Statistical information will be provided as required.

The policy was drafted September 2013, and TEC Academy will review it annually and assess its implementation and effectiveness.

Head teachers have a legal duty under the School Standards and Framework Act 1998 to draw up procedures to prevent bullying among pupils and to bring these procedures to the attention of staff, parents and pupils. Under the Education Inspections Bill 2006 the duties are extended to include preventing/responding to bullying that happens outside school, where it is reasonable to do so. Schools also have a duty to 'safeguard and promote the welfare of pupils' (Education Act 2002) and to ensure that children and young people are safe from bullying and discrimination (Children Act 2004). Government guidance advises that the policy should also address the bullying of staff by pupils ('Safe to learn' DCSF 2007).

Parents/carers

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- the Head of House will interview those involved and record the interviews
- Parents/Carers and other relevant adults will be kept informed
- where bullying takes place outside Academy, any other relevant schools or agencies (e.g. youth clubs, transport providers) will be informed about the concerns and any actions taken
- consequences will be used as appropriate and in consultation with all parties involved
